



Emergency Naloxone Kit

Naloxone is a fast-acting medication used to temporarily reverse the effects of an opioid overdose. It can be delivered via injection or as a nasal spray for the emergency treatment of a known or suspected opioid overdose.

Naloxone is safe to administer and will not cause harm. If opioids are not present in the body, it will have no effect.

Where is the Naloxone Kit located in the residence?

An Emergency Naloxone Kit, containing two doses of Nasal Naloxone, is available in the first aid cabinet on the second-floor landing in the north stairwell.

If Naloxone is missing or the kit has been tampered with, please inform the Rector.

Overdose response

Knowing how to respond to an overdose makes the residence community safer for everyone.

If someone is experiencing a known or suspected overdose:

- Immediately call 911
- Give Naloxone
- Notify Rector

The Good Samaritan Drug Overdose Act provides some legal protection for people who experience or witness an overdose and call 911 or their local emergency number for help.
